15 KM TITLES TO LIERS-WESTERFIELD, SCULLY

Niagara Falls, July 11--Walking a strong, steady race, Susan Liers-Westerfield shattered the course record and American Best Performance in winning today's National TAC Women's 15 Kilometer Championship. Susan's stunning 1:15:27 was a full minute and a half under the record Sue Brodock had set in the same race last year. Liers-Westerfield had been second in 1:18:00 that time. Her time has been bettered only by Australia's Sue Cook who had a 1:13:59 last summer.

The race was held simultaneously with the men's National--won by Todd Scully in 1:08:56. Liers-Westerfield actually finished twelfth overall and showed the men a thing or two about pacing. At the end of the first 2½km lap, she was in 22nd and then moved steadily through the field with 5 km splits of 24:55, 25:25, and 25:07. She was on her own from the start in the women's race, with Canada's Joan Bender better than 4 minutes back at the finish. Bender was able to pull clear of veteran Jeanne Bocci over the second half of the race.

Scully also had things very much his own way in the men's race and after drawing clear early on appeared to be going just hard enough to maintain a clear lead. When Helmut Boeck appeared to be closing some ground on the next-to-last lap, Todd responded easily and won by a full minute. Todd's splits were 22:28, 23:02, and 23:26.

Boeck outdueled Pete Timmons for second place (Pete is actually second in the National race, since Helmut is Canadian). These two and Tim Lewis were together after the first lap. By 5 km, Lewis was dropping back and Timmons was in second with Boeck on his heels. It stayed like that through 10 Km, where Boeck started to move away in an attempt to catch Scully. After dropping off these two, Lewis quickly found himself in a duel with Tom Edwards, which he was able to win over the final two laps. Meanwhile, local favorite Don Winiecki moved strongly through the field to capture sixth place just ahead of Glenn Sweazey. He then completed two more laps to go under 1:40 for 20 Km, on his own, and qualify to compete in the National Sports Festival in Syracuse.

In the Junior race, Lewis was an easy winner over Andy Liles and Rob Timmons. Sal Corrallo, now 50, walked his usual strong race to capture the Master's title, with Gerry Bocci edging host Dan Stanek for second. Fourth in this race was all 215 pounds of Dave Romansky in a rather amazing 1:22:24. The great strength that pulled Dave through to many national titles can also take a big tummy along for a pretty swift ride. Max Gould at 64 continues to impress, as he captured fifth.

Although the temperature was only in the mid to high 70's, a relentless sun on this shadeless course was taking its toll on the competitors. The results:

FROM HEEL TO TOE

Elsie McGarvey in Kalispell, Montana, a Centurion herself, reports that this country's first Centruion of the modern era, Larry O'Neill, is seriously ill. Larry was nearly 60 when he walked his first 100 miler in Columbia in 1967 and set an American record of 19:24:52. That stood for several years and Larry has walked quite a few more 100s in the meantime. Now Elsie Reports: "Larry entered the 100 mile race in Chula Vista last November but became dehydrated in the Santa Ana wind and had to stop early in the evening. Many of you noticed that he had slowed down a lot in the past year. However, he continued training this winter and spring, though he was becoming very unsure of his balance. By May, he had to stop frequently and the walks were shorter and fewer. He has had Parkinson's disease for several years and the doctors thought this was the problem. Those of us who knew him well were very concerned. A month ago he was still driving to his office and walking very slowly, but on June 2 his wife and daughter took him to the University of Washington hospital in Seattle. The neurologists there diagnosed his trouble as ALS (amyotrophic lateral sclerosis), more commonly known as Lou Gehrig's disease. Larry is aware of his condition and attempting to adjust. He--and all of us--had assumed he would continue training 50 or 60 miles a week into his 90s. This rapid deterioration to relative immobility has been quite a shock. ALS more commonly affects men 35-40 years old and is rarely seen after age 60. (The doctors said his race walking, including the 100 milers, was not a factor) He is at home now and would very much enjoy hearing from all of you. (Elsie's letter was addressed to Centurions, but that applies to anyone who knows and admires Larry.) Comradeship with fellow racewalkers has been important to him. His address: L.E. O'Neil, 233 Fifth Avenue East, Kalispell, Montana 59901." I'm sure the thoughts and prayers of all racewalkers reach out to Larry and his family. . . Nothing definite yet and no details, but there may be an opportunity for the very serious racewalkers out there to live and train together under a full-time coach/director. This would be at the USOC Training Center in Colorado Springs. Ron Laird would probably be the in-residence coach, footloose person that he is. Chairman Bob Kitchen has mentioned in his newsletter and is strongly behind it. Laird and Martin Rudow are working to bring it about as soon as possible. Ron will be supplying more details soon, which should appear in our next issue.

In the meantime, those of you out there of proven International standard and with serious Olympic medal aspirations might give the possibility of relocation some thought. Colorado Springs is a growing and prosperous community and decent jobs should be available. Laird, with his vast experience and always a serious student of the mechanics and physiology of the sport, seems well qualified to work with top athletes. The considerable time he has spent at the Mexican Training Center is an additional asset. . . The U.S. Lugano Cup team has been announced and will include Jim Heiring, Dan O'Connor, Marco Evoniuk, and Todd Scully at 20 Km and Vince O'Sullivan, Ray Sharp, Wayne Glusker, and Steve Pecinovsky at 50. Bob Lawson will be the team's coach/manager. Dean Ingram was originally elected to this position, but had to turn it down. . . A junior team of Tim Lewis, Mica Comstock, Jim Mann, and Andy Liles went to England from July 26 to August 1. The trip was to include competition in the British Junior National 10 Km. Dan Stanek was to accompany this group, replacing Gary Westerfield, who had been named originally. . . The following letter was written to Ajan Buchanan, editor of Race Walking Record, our British counterpart: Looking on the lighter side of things, I feel you might be interested in printing the following: "It is reported that footwear specialists in the Soviet Union are manufacturing boots that permit strollers to take steps of up to 9 feet long, and to move effortlessly at speeds of up to 15 mph. Pravda reports in Moscow that each boot heel contains a motor fueled by petrol that operates pistons implanted in the heels. The shoes consume about 2½ ounces of petrol per hour." Have we any walkers whose legs are capable of a stride of 108 inches? Or do they have to perservere until everything stretches until they reach that distance? What a lot of squeaky-voiced walkers we should finish up with.--Phil Collins. . . A race walking marriage early this year found Joe Berendt and Sally McPherson tying the knot. Both are currently in the Army. . . A recent 1 mile race in San Francisco was won by Mark Yeadaker in 8:43. This is significant only because Mark has run 800 meters in 1:44.93 this year and place in the TAC Nationals at that distance. Probably makes him the most outstanding runner to participate in a walking race in the midst of his career since Gerry Lindgren finished second in a Junior National 15 Km back in the '60s. Apparently Mark did some race walking in his younger days. If he walks enough races to become a bona fide race walker, he will easily top the 800 meter list in the ORWs all-time compilation of track and field performances by race walkers, which, incidentally, we haven't run for some time. . . Former Olympic walker Bill Weigle once again did very well in the Western States 100, a very demanding running race through the mountains. (The altitude over the course ranges from 8,750 feet to 800 feet. Bill finished fourth in 18:16, compared to his 19:53 for third last year. Last year he had mixed straight and bent-leg walking. This year he ran except for bent leg walking on the steeper uphill grades. Other active race walkers to finish the race were Fred Dunn, 68th in 23:28; Gary Ruttenberg, 64th in 23:34; Dale Sutton, 113th in 27:34; and Paul Hendricks, 128th in 28:41. Dunn was the first finisher over age 50--he is 52--and estimates he walked about 20 percent of the course. Of 252 starters in this year's race, 146 finished under the 30 hour limit. . . In Denver, race walkers Floyd Godwin, Bob Carlson, and Greg McGuire took part in an unusual 25-mile relay. They each walked a 1¼ mile leg on teams that included a canoeing leg, two bicycle legs, a roller skating leg, and two running legs, in addition to the walking leg. . .  15 Years Ago (From the July 1966 ORW)--Ron Daniel overcame the elements more than the field to win the National 30 Km in Columbia. With the temperature at 95 in the shade, but no shade on the course, it was a matter of survival, not performance. Ron's 2:57:07 left the fast rising Larry Young 4 minutes back and your editor another minute and a half behind. Two walkers, including sixth place Jack Blackburn, walked right out a shoe, which stuck in the hot tar. Early leader Ron Laird took over 4 hours to finish 13th. . . Rudy Maluza beat Laird, 1956 Olympic gold medalist (50 Km) Norm Read, Larry Walker, and Don DeKoon in an International 20 km in Los Angeles with 1:37:02.
 10 Years Ago (From the July 1971 ORW)--Paul Nihill, England, edged Nikolai Smaga in the USA-USSR-British Commonwealth 20 Km in San Francisco as both recorded 1:30:08. Tom Dooley finished fourth in 1:33:59. . . John Kelly won both the Mile (7:06) and 20 Km (1:42:38) at the National Masters meet. . . Lynn Olson won the Mile walk at the Women's National meet (the race was being stage for the first time and was termed an exhibition) in 7:53.8. Jeanne Bocci had 7:54 in second. Young Sue Brodock was fifth nearly 30 seconds behind. . . Nihill had a 2:30:35 in the British 20 Mile, a world's best at that time.
 5 Years Ago (From the July 1976 ORW)--Mexico's Daniel Bautista pulled well clear in the final 4 km to win the Olympic 20 km race in Montreal. Bautista had 1:24 40.6, with East Germans Hans-Georg Reimann, Peter Frenkel, and Karl-Heinz Städtmuller following in 1:25:13, 1:25:29, and 1:26:50. Ron Laird finished 20th in 1:33:27, Larry Walker 22nd in 1:34:19, and Todd Scully 29th in 1:36:37. . . Derek Harrison covered 131 miles 336 yards in a 24-hour track race in England. Colin Young was second, some 29 yards over 129 miles. Harrison went through 100 in 18:04:07, just 8 minutes ahead of Young. . . Old Jack Mortland won the National Masters 10 Km in Chicago, as practically no one else showed up, and was reminded of the Columbia death march some 10 years earlier as a blazing sun beat down on the Stagg Field track putting the temperature in the mid 90s. We shouldn't record the time, but it was 55:11.
